Bozeman Program Notes:

Sociology Electives for General Sociology option: Students must take 30 additional credits from any courses designated as SOCI. All but 6 credits must be in upper-division courses.

Sociology Electives for Criminology option: Students must take 15 elective credits of Criminology designated SOCI courses and 15 credits of any courses designated as SOCI. All but 6 of the 30 elective credits must be in upper-division courses. HC's SOCI 211 will count as SOCI 311 equivalency and will not count toward the 6 credit lower-division elective maximum.

**Career Info:** Sociologists are employed by research institutes, the criminal justice system, public health and welfare organizations, private businesses, law firms, international agencies, medical centers, educational institutions, advertising firms, survey and polling organizations, and beyond. Students with a bachelor's degree in sociology often secure employment as social researchers, case workers, paralegals, public relations workers, administrators, community organizers, public policy researchers, and data analysts. Sociology also provides great preparation for going on to law school, medical school, business school, and for graduate degree programs in social work, education, public policy, religious ministry, mass communications, public health, non-profit administration, and international affairs.
